Asst. Principal Clarinetist, Asst. Principal Bassoonist Earn Spots in Top Ensembles

KANSAS CITY, Mo. | June 26, 2013 — The Kansas City Symphony is pleased to announce that two of its musicians, Boris Allakhverdyan, associate principal clarinetist, and Miles Maner, associate principal bassoonist and contrabassoonist, have accepted positions with two of the nation's top performing arts organizations, the Metropolitan Opera and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, respectively.

Allakhverdyan won the coveted position of Principal Clarinet for the MET. Maner will play bassoon and contrabassoon for the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

He earned his Bachelor of Music degree from the Tchaikovsky Moscow Conservatory in 2006, his Artist Diploma Degree from the Oberlin Conservatory in 2008 and his Master of Music degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music in 2010. His principal teachers have included Franklin Cohen, Richard Hawkins, Rafael Bagdasarian and Valery Allakhverdyan. He has won multiple prestigious awards and has performed with orchestras all over the world.

"I was very fortunate to spend four full seasons with the Kansas City Symphony," Allakhverdyan said. "I would like to thank all of my colleagues in the orchestra, Music Director Michael Stern, Executive Director Frank Byrne and everyone on staff who made my experience in Kansas City truly memorable. The Kansas City Symphony family will always have a special place in my heart!"

Maner joined the Kansas City Symphony in 2010 as associate principal bassoonist and contrabassoonist. Maner earned his bachelor's degree at the University of Texas in 2007. He earned his master's degree at Rice University in 2009. His principal teachers have included Benjamin Kamins of Rice University and Kristin Wolfe Jensen of the University of Texas. Maner has attended various summer music festivals and has earned top awards for his playing.

"The three years I've completed with the Kansas City Symphony will always be the three most significant musical years of my career," Maner said. "I've grown tremendously as a musician in order to meet the challenges of this fine orchestra, and every effort on my part was worth the work. The Kansas City Symphony is my first musical family and I will always be tremendously proud of that.
